Colonel Johnson was a 1968 graduate of Western Olin High School, Birmingham, Alabama, a 1980 graduate of Benedict College, Columbia, South Carolina, and a 1993 graduate of the Command and Staff General College, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.

Colonel Johnson was married to Reverend Mary Eichelberger Johnson, the love of his life, for fifty years. From the first time he saw Mary on the yard of Benedict College, he knew she would be his forever girl. Through his union to Mary, he became the proud father of Reverend Lametis A. Johnson, who is the Pastor of Greater Mount Pisgah A.M.E. Church, St. Matthews, SC and Howard Tryon Johnson, Musician for Trinity House of Help and Mercy. Colonel Johnson was also an extremely devoted grandfather to Mariah Latreese Johnson.

Colonel Johnson retired from the United States Army Reserve, in 2007 after thirty-seven years of faithful and dedicated service.
