# Reflections of the Life of Mrs. Conchita Veronica Bessellieu Edens

Our Mother, a loving wife, a devoted mother, an affectionate grandmother, a protective daughter, a warmhearted sister, a compassionate aunt, a loyal friend and a dedicated educator came to life on August 2, 1942, into the loving hands of our grandparents, the late Deacon Fredrick "Freddie" Douglas Bessellieu and Ethel Elizabeth Moses Bessellieu, at the Historic Kelly Memorial Hospital in Kingstree, SC. She transitioned from this life on October 15, 2023, at the Lexington Medical Hospital in Lexington, SC. Mommy was preceded in death by her parents and siblings: her brother, Fredrick "F.D." Douglas, Jr., sister Sandra and half-sister Nancy.

Mommy was the selfless anchor who always put family first. She was our everything - our air, our breath, our support, our inspiration, our best friend, our rock. Not only did she truly love her family, but she loved others as well, and if she had the power to help anyone, she always did. She cherished talking on the phone to catch up and check on everyone. She adored spending time with family and friends or just sharing a meal enjoying her favorite seafood, vegetables and sweets. She loved talking and spoke with her sister, Sandra, daily, as well as facetiming with her grandchildren on the phone where she often gave lessons, listened to concerts, and heard about everything going on in their daily lives. She loved reading the newsfeed on her phone and keeping up with current events. Any afternoon, she could be found watching Hallmark Movies, a favorite pastime.

Conchita grew up in Georgetown, SC, on "The Block" as it was affectionately called – a block on Emanuel Street where our family and extended family dwelled: Her Mom and Dad (Nana and Granddaddy) and sister, Sandy; Aunt "Me-Me" Camille, Uncle Barber and her sibling-cousins, Uncle Eli, Aunt Shirley, Uncle Brendon and Dwayne; Uncle Tom and Aunt Vivian; "Aunt Kitty" and Vonnie and the extended families. She was educated in the Georgetown County (SC) School System, and an honor graduate of Howard High School, Class of 1959. She earned the Bachelor of Arts degree from Fisk University, Nashville, TN, and completed her teacher certification from the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, NY. She received her master's degree from the University of South Carolina in Columbia.

Her love, faith and trust in God took root at an early age. Mommy received the foundation of her religious training in the home. At a young age, she joined Bethesda Missionary Baptist Church in Georgetown, under the pastorate of the late Reverend Frank K. Sims. Here is where she was active in the Sunday School, youth choir, youth programs, and began her journey as a church musician, becoming the assistant to the church organist at just 12 years old. While in college, Connie spent her summers sharing her love of music, teaching music lessons at home to her family members and children within the community, as well as serving as the pianist in the Charles Williams Combo where they played for special parties and occasions.

As she journeyed into married life, motherhood, and a career, Mommy viewed and cherished her role as an educator so much more than someone who simply provided instruction to a class. In her words she believed, "Within the haven, the classroom, we are entrusted with precious minds of students of varied races, creeds, colors, and patterns of behavior, religions and social status. We must be dedicated to the advancement of each student. We must encourage and inspire. We must help students to strengthen their inner values, to filter out the evils, to nurture the good, and to build high self-esteem. Our role extends beyond simply teaching.... It is our mission to project joy that will help students to receive messages of beauty, of cheer, and of the joy of learning." Mommy formed special and long-lasting bonds with her students and so many others through a philosophy expressed in her own words: "In performing our roles [as teachers], we must have built-in tools which are known as caring, sharing, praising, preparing and being models of selflessness, positivity, integrity and sincerity." She used music as her tool of choice to plant seeds for students to grow into trees of wisdom, hope, history, courage, and belief in themselves. Connie's composition tapestries watered and nurtured those seeds into melodious blossoming possibilities. She strived to instill motivation, courage, and a sense of pride in her students and everyone with whom she interacted. And it is that sense of pride that flourished in every student chorus member and church choir member she educated and directed. She felt music in its purest form allowed everyone to take down their barriers in order to connect and build community. Mommy continuously instilled those same core values and morals into her children; daughters Leevette and Chantis; sons Lee and Shaun, her grandchildren, her son-in-law, daughter-in-law, grandson-in-law, sibling-cousins, nieces, nephews, and countless others.

Mommy continued to expand her passion for teaching, becoming the chorus teacher at Fairwold Junior High School in Columbia, SC. In 1971, she was hired as the first African American chorus teacher at Columbia High School, where she taught for 36 years and simultaneously taught at St. Andrews Junior High for a few years. While at Columbia High School, she established herself as an outstanding teacher, teaching courses such as Chorus, Guitar, Piano Keyboarding, and Teacher Cadet. The singers were often praised for their beauty of tone, artistic technique, and innovative programming. Many of her students auditioned and were selected as choir participants for the South Carolina Music Educators Association National Conference All-State Choirs.

### Memories

















Mommy believed in the importance of sharing the gift of music with others. Under her direction, her choirs received local, district, state, and national recognition, performing in Florida (Walt Disney World) and throughout South Carolina, to include the South Carolina Governor's Mansion, the South Carolina School Board Association Performance at Hilton Head, SC, The South Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice, the VA Hospital, Fort Jackson and Bull Street Mental Hospital. Her choirs also performed for annual Black History, Easter and Winter/Spring Holiday programs at various churches, feeder schools and Columbia Mall. One of her greatest joys was teaching piano lessons in our home. Her students not only learned piano techniques, but they were showered with her love and joy while also acquiring the values and morals that she cherished.

In addition to her natural talent for teaching and working with children, Mommy was blessed with an innate talent for decorating. She loved transforming spaces into whatever she could imagine, creating beautiful experiences through collaborations with students, faculty, staff, friends and family. Spending that time outside the classroom became an essential element to the family environment she created, fostered and nurtured. Connie took time to get to know everyone and she could call every student by name whenever she would see them out in the community. Conchita B. Edens was the ultimate beacon of planning, organizing and directing various events from weddings, funerals, concerts, and pageants, to any special occasion where people came together. Conchita's "Touch of Class" was unique and could not be replicated.

While at Columbia High School, she also served as the School Calendar Contact which included booking and running the auditorium, as well as serving as the director and chairperson of the Miss Columbia High School Pageant. She played for Class Nights and CHS graduations along with other high school graduations in the district. She served as the District Lead Choral Teacher for many years and was an Advanced ED-Trained Lead Evaluator, serving on numerous accreditation teams. She mentored 1994's Miss America, Kimberly Aiken Cockerham, and served as her chorus teacher, preparing her for the talent portion where she performed "Summertime," from George Gershwin's Porgy and Bess. Conchita took an active role in community projects and programs. Our Mommy made a lifetime commitment of service through Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated in fall 1961 at Fisk University in the Alpha Beta Chapter and continued with the Columbia SC Alumnae Chapter. She rendered her talents as Minister of Music/Director at several churches such as Second Calvary Baptist Church and Northminster Presbyterian Church. She was also a well-known Wedding Director/Planner and served the community in many other capacities. She was selected as the Columbia High School Teacher of the Year. Subsequently she was honored as the 1993-1994 Richland County School District One District Teacher of Year, where she was the first music teacher, district-wide, to receive this honor. Conchita taught in the Richland County School District One for 42 years until her retirement in 2006.
