"The Lord is My Shepherd" – Psalm 23

Ms. Rubie Ella Nixon Schumpert was born in Richland County, South Carolina on November 22, 1917. Rubie was the third of nine children born to Sumpter Nixon and Ella Bell Suber Nixon. On Tuesday, April 2, 2024, Rubie departed this life peacefully in the comfort of her home after 106 years of being an educator, volunteer, mother, world-traveler, community leader, grandmother, and great-grandmother. She lived a beautiful life.

Rubie was raised in a family that valued hard work and education. During her early years of study, she attended Pine Grove Elementary in Richland County, SC, Biddle Street Elementary in Baltimore, Maryland, and Irmo Elementary School in Irmo, South Carolina. She graduated from high school as valedictorian from Harbison Institute in Irmo, South Carolina. Following high school, with a scholarship to Barber Scotia, Rubie began her formal years of higher education. She attended Barber Scotia College in Concord, North Carolina, and Benedict College in Columbia, South Carolina where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree. Rubie earned her Master of Education from South Carolina State College in Orangeburg, SC. Not being a person to rest on her laurels, she furthered her studies at Wake Forest University and the University of South Carolina. She obtained certifications in six areas of study: Elementary Education, Social Studies, English, Mathematics, French, and Counseling. Over the course of her career, she taught all areas of study. While earning her degrees, Rubie met John Barton Schumpert. In 1941, the two wed in Lexington County. They became the parents of two daughters, LaVerne and LaMaris. Professionally, Rubie worked to enhance the minds of young people as an educator in the public schools. She began her teaching career in Lexington County, where she taught at the elementary and high school levels. Her skillful teaching earned her positions as head teacher and elementary principal. In 1957, she moved to Richland County School District One where she taught as a mathematics teacher and counselor at C. A. Johnson High School. Her expert pedagogy in mathematics earned her the position of department chairman of mathematics. Her skills were recognized by leaders in higher education where she collaborated with a team of educators to coauthor a mathematics textbook with federal grant funding through the University of South Carolina. The mathematics textbook served as a guide for students who took trade courses and not on track to attend college. When presented with an opportunity to support the United States military, she wrote, produced, and appeared in televised lectures designed to aid and support soldiers in mathematics. She also believed that children should receive a quality education. As such, she served on the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) where she worked to ensure the improvement of education in the South through accreditation.

In 1987, after more than 45 years in education, she retired from Richland County School District One. She returned to her alma mater, Benedict College, where she served as a mathematics professor for 10 years. Education was central to her life, and after more than 50 years, she formally entered retirement. However, she continued to tutor students in mathematics. Rubie Schumpert's contributions for 50+ years in education were recognized by distinguished honors, certificates and awards. By example, The Columbia Alumni Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Incorporated presented her with the Golden Years Award for service in education.

Obituary

She was presented with the Key to the City of Columbia and a Proclamation of Rubie Schumpert Day by the Honorable Mayor Steve Benjamin. Further proclamations in her honor were issued by U.S. Congressman James E. Clyburn and S.C. House of Representative Leon Howard. She was awarded the Outstanding Educator's Award by the National Association of University Women. The Congressional Record tribute and a Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition on the 100th birthday was presented to her by the Honorable James Clyburn for her distinguished service in education and recognition as a centenarian. She received the Enduring Spirit Award from Friends of African American Arts and Culture (FAAAC) for her work in the community. The Presbyterian Women of Northminster Presbyterian Church honored her at the Women of Faith Celebration for her inspiring and uplifting spiritual journey. She was presented with the Smucker's 100th Birthday Celebration Award by Al Roker on the NBC Today Show. The Distinguished Graduate Honor from Barber Scotia College was bestowed upon her by the President, Dr. Melvin Isadore Douglass. She was honored by her beloved alma mater with the Resolution of Commendation from Benedict College, and one of her greatest honors was her 100th birthday celebration hosted by her daughters and eldest granddaughter at Trinity Baptist Church's Family Life Center.

She was admired by many and looked upon as a woman of wisdom, strength, style, beauty and kindness. Having lived more than a century on this earth, she often shared and gave witness to many historical events. She lived through World War I and World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, two Gulf wars, 9/11, and the insurrection on the Nation's Capital. She survived the Great Depression and the Great Recession. She lived through the Jim Crow era and witnessed Martin Luther King, Jr.'s leadership during the Civil Rights era, and later his assassination. She watched as the Confederate flag was hoisted a top of the South Carolina State House in 1962 at the dawn of the Civil Rights era. For more than 50 years, she watched as that Confederate flag waved freely until its removal in 2015 in the wake of the mass shooting of the Emmanuel Nine at Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, SC. During her lifetime, she saw 19 men become president of the United States, including Barack Obama, the first African American President in 2008. In 2020, she was able to see another first in politics when Madam Kamala Harris became the first Black female Vice President. She was proud to see African Americans travel into space, one of which was her former student Charles Bolden; and she was featured in a New York Times article entitled "Black Schools Restored as Landmarks" which highlighted her and the two-room school house in the Pine Grove area.

As much as she loved traveling, she devoted much of her time to the community. She held membership in many professional and civic organizations including her Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, National Education Association, National Association of University Women, Broad River Heights Community Association, American Business Women, and Benedict College Alumnae Club #1. Her greatest joy was spending time with her family where she regularly welcomed them to her home. Culinary art is a prominent part of African American culture, and Rubie wore this badge of honor proudly. Her specialties included squash with red peppers and candied yams with pineapples. She loved entertaining and playing the organ. She hosted the first Nixon Family Reunion on the back lawn of her home, before the gatherings developed into the Nixon Family Reunions at various venues.

Faith was central to Rubie's life. As a child and young adult, she was a devoted and faithful member of Pine Grove AME Church. After her marriage to John Barton Schumpert, she moved her membership to Mount Zion Baptist Church in Chapin, SC. It was there that they served as a family until her husband's passing in 1961. To be closer to home, she moved her membership to Saint John Baptist Church in Columbia, SC where she served for many years. She worked in many ministries including the Sunday School, Missionary Society, and one of the family units. For many years, she hosted her church family unit in her home for the annual Christmas celebrations. Her favorite scripture, Psalm 23, was learned as a child and guided her path throughout her life because it lifted her spirits daily.

Rubie's husband, Barton, promised to take her on a trip around the world, but due to his untimely death, their joint travels did not happen. Her desire to see the world led her to join with a dear friend, Mary Tompkins, a widow of a military officer, to travel around the world. Together, they traveled throughout North America, South America, Europe, Asia, and Africa. Rubie wrote, "One of the most incomparable experiences a person can have is an opportunity to study the culture of other people in their native setting and see history come alive." She enjoyed sharing her travel experiences. During her travels, she amassed international garments and cultural expressions of which she shared in fashion shows, lectures, and cultural showcases. She received credits from the South Carolina Education Department for the chronology of her global travels. When asked about her travels, she proudly said, "I walked the path that Jesus walked on his way to Calvary."

She was preceded in death by her beloved husband, John Barton Schumpert. Additionally, she was predeceased by eight brothers and sisters: Novie Nixon, Lester Nixon, Ollie Nixon Washington, Cleoniece C. Nixon Rhett, Ada Nixon Heller, Mabel Nixon Guider, Lessie Nixon, and Ione Nixon Knight.
