Obituary

Ms. Sheila Denise Corbin-Dewitt along with her twin Norman Corbin who preceded her in death were born to the late George S. Corbin and Muriel A. Corbin on May 1, 1956, in Brooklyn, New York. Raised in a close-knit Caribbean family, Sheila and her siblings knew full well the importance of the love and support of an extended family. Their grandmother, Viola Carmichael, "Nana" was the glue that helped keep them together. This beautifully blended family of aunts, uncles, and cousins lived on or near Bainbridge Street, in Brooklyn, where many of them migrated from Barbados and worshipped at St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Bedford Stuyvesant.

Sheila was educated in New York City Public Schools. She attended P.S. 262 and JHS 35. In 1974, she graduated from Sheepshead Bay High School. As a teenager Sheila spent her time close to home reading, crocheting, and hanging out with her friends (Vanessa, Janet, and Phyllis). They were oftentimes inseparable. In those days a typical Saturday consisted of hanging out in "Cannons" on Reid Avenue, eating french fries, listening to the latest songs on a mini jukebox, and deciding which one to buy next door at the neighborhood record shop.

In 1974, Sheila married Raymond Ross. From their union her daughter Sintasha and son Taaleak (predeceased) were born. As a young mom, she took the role of "Mommy" very seriously. With her mom and her extended family, the children were taught the value of family and community.

Sheila was well known for her children's birthday parties and family celebrations. Good food, laughter, and family stories were enjoyed by all. One of her signature dishes was her sweet potatoes with pineapple and marshmallow topping casserole. On August 7, 1987, she married Michael Dewitt and from their union, Michael "Lemee" was born.

Sheila's career in health care began many years ago in private practice, where she gained the knowledge and skills needed to move on to working in the hospital setting. She worked at State University of New York at Downstate Medical Center and Stony Brook Hospital for eighteen years as a Health Unit Coordinator before retiring from the state health system and relocating to South Carolina. After Sheila and Michael's move to South Carolina in 2003, she obtained employment at Providence Health at the Northeast Campus. She had been employed there for the last twenty-one years, where she enjoyed the work and the comradery with her friends and co-workers.
