



Obituary

Lester Edward Phillips was born on May 30, 1926, in Darlington, South Carolina. He was the youngest child of the late Lester and Coramae Phillips. Lester departed this life on Saturday, November 16, 2024.

Lester was educated in the public schools of Hartsville, SC and graduated from Butler High School. During this time, he became the first black Eagle Scout in South Carolina.

In 1945, he entered the United States Army and attended basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, MO. He trained as a construction engineer and was assigned to help in the rebuilding of the German infrastructure following WWII. Once stateside, he enrolled in South Carolina State University (formerly known as the Colored Normal, Industrial, Agricultural and Mechanical College of South Carolina), where he majored in Agricultural Science and participated in the college's ROTC program. Upon graduation, he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army Infantry.

In 1951, he was one of the first African American officers to go into the 45th Infantry Division. His service continued in Japan, South Carolina, Germany, Vietnam, and the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, where he was a professor of military science.

After a career spanning more than thirty years, he retired from active duty in 1974 at Fort Jackson with seventeen awards to his credit, including two Bronze Stars and a Combat Infantry Badge with Stars.

After retiring, Lester began the next chapter of his life as a small businessman in Columbia, SC. He owned and operated the "Stop and Shop" convenience store, a laundry mat, and a residential care facility in the Fairwold and Greenview Communities. It was during this time that Lester met and married Alice Middleton. Together they would spend the next 47 years raising their three children Michael, Coramae, and Christopher.

Lester became a member of Greenview First Baptist Church in 1980 and served until his passing. He was preceded in death by his parents, Lester Phillips and Cora Mae Hunter Wall; siblings, Ethel Phillips, George Phillips, Mildred Juanita Phillips, Wilson Kirven, Samuel Lee Sharper Sr., Charles Ervin Sharper, Ruby Mae Phillips, Ethel Mae Sharper, and Marion Phillips Lighty; and one son, Eric Edgar Furnace Phillips of Hamlet, NC.

Lester is survived by his beloved wife, Alice Middleton Phillips; his children, Marvis Phillips Bookert (Reubin), Lester Edward Phillips IV, Travis Laverne Phillips, Dr. Sonja Renée Phillips, Michael Bernard Phillips, LTC (Ret), Coramae Leslie Phillips Neely (Chris), and Christopher Alan Phillips; sister, Elizabeth Phillips Graham; ten grandchildren, one great grandchild, and many other loving relatives and friends, all of whom will miss him dearly.
